Who we are: The Greensboro Gem and Mineral Club, Inc.

First chartered in 1954, our Club decided to incorporate and secure a tax exempt 501.C.3 status. We accomplished this on June 15, 1999. The purposes for which this corporation is organized are:

- to promote the study of mineralogy, geology, the lapidary arts and related subjects; to collect and preserve minerals and gem materials;
- to provide the opportunity for purchase, exchange and exhibition of specimens and materials;
- to assist others in accomplishing the foregoing; and
- to engage in any lawful act or activity for which corporations may be organized under NorthCarolina Nonprofit Corporation Act.

Over the years, these purposes were and are achieved by providing monthly Club meetings with guest speakers, two open auctions per year, Show and Tell (wherein members bring their new or old accomplishments and present to the membership), field trips (wherein members go into mines to find materials and visit various museums), Gem and Mineral public Shows, providing lapidary arts at local community colleges and the Greensboro Arts Center, the Club members to provide mineral, geology, education and specimens to students attending Elementary, Middle, and High Schools from Rowan County to the west to Durham Countyto the east, both public and private.

President's Corner



Hello everyone! I reached out to the Friends facility to see when they thought the restrictions might be lifted. They replied and informed me they would not be lifting restrictions until the new year, "if then." We obviously need a new facility, or we will be doing Zoom meetings for the unforeseeable future! Brian Burdette suggested a place in the Oak Ridge shopping center at the intersection of Hwy 68 and Hwy 150, just across the street from the Oak Ridge Academy. If you want to put the address in your GPS, it is 2205 Oak Ridge Rd, Oak Ridge. Brian, Gary and I met with the owner. We were able to negotiate the same price we are currently paying. The owner also owns and operates Bistro 150 which is next door. She encouraged me to suggest to our members they can eat dinner prior to the meeting. The food is excellent and very reasonable prices. The room is considerably smaller than the previous facility so we will use it and see if it will meet our needs. Please continue

to give me suggestions of any other places that we can rent for \$50 per meeting or less. I'll continue to check these out and see if a different place would suit us better.

Gary Parker has secured the dig for the huge garnets in Stuart, Virginia. The directions and details are on page 6. Additionally, Charles Whicker has finalized the details to get us to the Amos Cunningham mine in Due West, SC. The date is 10/23. Charlie will provide all the details and I will forward those to all of you. The Cunningham farm has a large vein of beryl that produces some very nice specimens. Both should be great fun. You may also find quartz and amethyst crystals.

The October meeting will be the club auction at the new facility. You may bring your own specimens for the auction. Please provide a label with your item with its identity, location it is from and any reserve price that you require. A side note, at the Forsyth Club auction, Charlie had a Kentucky geode that he put a reserve of \$5 on. It did not sell. We cut it open at the show and it was probably worth 75 to 100 dollars!! So, remember the reserve price is the minimum you will take and indicates the lowest wholesale value normally. The Club will take 20% of the total sale price. We will also be auctioning Club-owned specimens.

We need nominations for the following positions for 2022: President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer and 3 new Board members due for rotation. The Board members leaving are Vickie Hodges, Charlie Finch, and Ed Deckert. Once we have determined who will run (or continue to serve) in these positions, I need the nominees to send me a short bio that speaks of information you deem appropriate to support your nomination. Also, include a recent photo of yourself. This will go in the October newsletter so the membership can read prior to the actual election at the November meeting. Current officers and Board members, please let me know if you are willing to continue to serve.

I will not be at the November meeting and Gary will conduct it in my absence. I refuse to ask VP, Kathie Montgomery, to fill in for anything at that time of year because she helps folks with Medicare enrollment and insurance. It's kinda like an accountant at tax time, she will be substantially overwhelmed. Sharon and I are taking a very big rockhounding trip through South Dakota, eastern Wyoming and my favorite, agates on the Yellowstone River in Montana. I hope to put a program together on this trip to present to you all, provided we find good stuff!!

Current balance: \$399. When the opportunity is available again, depending on how much is in the fund, up to two people can take a class each year. The schools are one week of classes at either the <u>William Holland School</u> or <u>Wildacres Retreat</u>, or one class at <u>Sawtooth School for Visual Arts</u> in Winston Salem, In order to qualify for the scholarship, recipients must be a member in good standing for at least one year, pay for the school initially, and then give the club a program about the school, e.g. information about their class, the instruction, a sample of what they made, a demonstration, etc. A wide variety of classes are offered—cabochons, wire wrapping, faceting, silver, gem trees, casting, beading, etc.

Auction Rules:

- (1) Sellers are allowed to sell a maximum of 10 items each for the "LIVE Auction". They will also be allowed to sell a maximum of 5 items in the "SILENT Auction". (There is no limit to the number of items donated to the club to be auctioned off).
- 2) Proceeds are divided between the seller (80%), and the Club (20%), if an item sells. Items may be donated to the Club, in which the Club retains the full amount of the sale. Any donated items not sold will be used for future auctions or door prizes.
- (3) Items must be related to our hobby. This includes minerals, books, jewelry, tools, fossils, supplies, cut stones, etc. Non-mineral items not donated to the club will not be offered up by the Auctioneers. (for example if someone donates a bicycle to the club, we will sell it, but they can't include it as part of the items sold for individual profit)
- (4) All sellers and buyers MUST get a number assigned (sellers must get one before the auctioning starts!). The number is used to know who is selling which item, and who has the winning bid. The first *registered* person would be 1, then the next is 2, and so on. Sellers can contact Rick Godbee by email at godbee58@gmail.com before the event to get their assigned number or get it as soon as you arrive at the meeting!
- (5) All items must be labeled. A "Post-It" or piece of paper is fine. The label will include the seller's number and a unique letter of the alphabet (a thru j), the name/description of the item, and (if applicable) location details. If there is a minimum bid for an item, it must be noted on the label.
- (6) For the Live auction, items are auctioned off in a manner to make everything fair. Items will be sold as follows: 1a, 2a, 3a, 4a, 5a, and so on so that everyone has a chance to sell their items. For, items donated to the club, the club will be assigned several numbers to space the club items in with the other items. Then we go to everyone's second item, like 1b, 2b, 3b, 4b, etc
- (7) For the silent auction, items should be valued by the seller at over \$20 with minimum bid steps at 10% of the previous offer rounded up to the next even dollar. This is to keep the total number of bids for an item down.
- (7) Items sold will be given to the buyer after they are sold and paid. The buyer will settle up for all items purchased (and turn in their card) before they leave. Cash and checks are allowable modes of payment no credit/debit cards. The club can use PayPal, as well. We will let people in to bring in their items and to preview things that are for sale before the sale. The room will be open at 6:30 and the auction will start promptly at 7:15. Please come with sufficient time to display the items for sellers, get your number, and preview the items you wish to bid on. We will take brief intermissions about halfway through to look at items in the silent auction you may not have had time to view, but you will not be allowed to simply walk up to look during the auction! The auction will end no later than 8:30. At that time, we will remove our material, settle up for purchases, disburse funds to sellers, and clean up the room. Plan to be out no later than 9:00.

Note: the Club can pay sellers with PayPal, cash if available in correct amounts, or check.


GGMC Field Trip, submitted by Gary Parker

Private property near Stuart, VA, 10:00 – 5:00

Please do not arrive before 10:00AM. We have been granted permission to collect almandite garnets from the property listed below. The garnets from this area form as dodecahedron crystals and occur in chlorite schist. They range in size from one to three inches in diameter, but I have seen garnets almost as big as grapefruits. They are not gem quality but are excellent specimens as individual crystals or crystals in matrix.

Tools: Chisels, pry bars, heavy hammers. WEAR EYE PROTECTION if using hammers and chisels.

NOTE: It is necessary to wade the stream to get to the bluff where matrix specimens are plentiful.
