First chartered in 1954, our Club decided to incorporate and secure a tax exempt 501.C.3 status. We accomplished this on June 15, 1999. The purposes for which this corporation is organized are:

- to promote the study of mineralogy, geology, the lapidary arts and related subjects; to collect and preserve minerals and gem materials;
- to provide the opportunity for purchase, exchange and exhibition of specimens and materials;
- to assist others in accomplishing the foregoing; and
- to engage in any lawful act or activity for which corporations may be organized under North Carolina Nonprofit Corporation Act.

Over the years, these purposes were and are achieved by providing monthly Club meetings with guest speakers, two open auctions per year, Show and Tell (wherein members bring their new or old accomplishments and present to the membership), field trips (wherein members go into mines to find materials and visit various museums), Gem and Mineral public Shows, providing lapidary arts at local community colleges and the Greensboro Arts Center, the Club members to provide mineral, geology, education and specimens to students attending Elementary, Middle, and High Schools from Rowan County to the west and to Durham County to the east, both public and private.

How to get to the meeting:

McCreery Scholarship

Starting in 2025,* one person each year will be granted a scholarship of \$250 for one week of classes at either the [William Holland School](#) or [Wildacres Retreat](#), or one class at [Sawtooth School for Visual Arts](#) in Winston Salem, In order to qualify for the scholarship, recipients must be a member in good standing for at least one year, pay for the school initially, and then give the club a program about the school, e.g. information about their class, the instruction, a sample of what they made, a demonstration, etc. A wide variety of classes are offered—cabochons, wire wrapping, faceting, silver, gem trees, casting, beading, etc. Those interested in applying for those funds will nominate themselves and a recipient will be chosen at random from those who have thrown their name in the hat.

AFMS Code of Ethics

- I will respect both private and public property and will do no collecting on privately owned land without the owner's permission.
- I will keep informed on all laws, regulations or rules governing collecting on public lands and will observe them.
- I will, to the best of my ability, ascertain the boundary lines of property on which I plan to collect.
- I will use no firearms or blasting material in collecting areas.
- I will cause no willful damage to property of any kind - fences, signs, buildings, etc.
- I will leave all gates as found.
- I will build fires in designated or safe places only and will be certain they are completely extinguished before leaving the area.
- I will discard no burning material - matches, cigarettes, etc.
- I will fill all excavation holes which may be dangerous to livestock.
- I will not contaminate wells, creeks, or other water supplies.
- I will cause no willful damage to collecting material and will take home only what I can reasonably use.
- I will support the rockhound project H.E.L.P. (Help Eliminate Litter Please) and will leave all collecting areas devoid of litter, regardless of how found.
- I will cooperate with field-trip leaders and those in designated authority in all collecting areas.
- I will report to my club or federation officers, Bureau of Land Management or other authorities, any deposit of petrified wood or other materials on public lands which should be protected for the enjoyment of future generations for public educational and scientific purposes.
- I will appreciate and protect our heritage of natural resources.
- I will observe the "Golden Rule," will use "Good Outdoor Manners," and will at all times conduct myself in a manner which will add to the stature and public "image" of rockhounds everywhere.

Highlights Of the August 2024 Meeting

Date of Meeting: August 5, 2024

President Dan Cole convened the meeting at 7 pm. There were 28 attendees, and one new member. Due to illness, Gary Parker was unable to present his program on Tumbling. We were able to have an extensive discussion on Club finances, programs, and procedures, with most members participating. Mary Pegram, Treasurer, provided detailed information on our revenue and expenses, including historical data. As we had a quorum, the following changes were approved:

No hospitality reimbursement (except Xmas dinner) commencing in 2025.
Increase annual dues to \$25 (\$30 family) commencing in 2025.

We also agreed that a committee should be created to examine donation possibilities as an additional source of revenue. We were not able to reach a consensus on new vendor fees for our Show, so that discussion will continue.

An Asteroid Exploded Over Berlin. Then, the Treasure Hunt Began

The celestial event turned the night sky into a spectacle, spurring a race on the ground for cosmic fragments.

- On January 21, an asteroid dubbed 2024 BX1—spotted only three hours earlier—collided with the Earth near Berlin, Germany.
- Within days, meteorite hunters scoured the area to find samples of the space rock and found a translucent, glassy aubrite—a rare kind of space rock.
- Samples from 2024 BX1 and other asteroids like them can help scientists learn more about where these rocks hail from.

TRIP: This will be a dig on one of our members' own land, as such it has had very little activity there. There are no tailings available, it's mainly virgin.

COLLECTING: The owner of the property (and a very serious collector) has found epidote, garnet, quartz (in its various forms), quartz arrowheads, actinolite, hematite, magnetite, and other iron minerals.

BRING: This is basically pasture land with a few trees thrown in so no mountaineering equipment is needed, just the standard shovel and pick and screen stuff. Muddiness is entirely dependent on the weather. Clothes, footwear and mosquito repellent is up to you. Bring safety glasses if you want to break rocks.

REQUIREMENTS: This is private property, so please be respectful of the owner and the property.

FEE: \$20 per person.

REGISTRATION: Click [here](#) to fill out a registration form. If you register and are unable to attend the trip, **please be considerate** to your fellow rockhounds and let us know as soon as possible so someone on a potential waiting list can take your slot(s).

CHILDREN: Yes, but as per common sense: you're the custodian, not us.

PETS: No, unless you want to keep them in your car with it running and the AC on, so essentially **NO**.

FACILITIES: There will be an upscale porta-potty on site (with a sink) and easy parking.

ACCOMMODATIONS: Clemson University is very close, so there are many hotels/motels available in Clemson and in nearby towns.

DIRECTIONS AND WHERE TO MEET: Registered participants will be sent a confirmation email with directions and meeting place details.

CARPOOLING: The registration form has a place for you to indicate if you **need** a ride; if you can **offer** a ride; or if you would like to **drive or share** a carpool ride. If you choose any of these options, your name, email address, and club name will be shared with other members who also choose one of the options. Then, you can communicate with one another to arrange carpools.

This trip is an extra DMC trip for September. It was originally scheduled for September 2023 and had to be rescheduled due to dangerous weather.



COLLECTING: Willis Mountain is what's known as a monadnock. The kyanite exposure resisted weathering and, as the surrounding area was eroded and weathered away, the mountain outcrop was left standing. The center of the mountain has been mostly mined away. We should be able to find plenty of white kyanite blades in the massive kyanite quartzite; pyrite; quartz; hematite with some iridescence, red mica, green mica, apatite, and possibly some blue kyanite and pale green trolleite. Some of the white kyanite and quartz here have a beautiful light blue fluorescence and the apatite is yellow so bring your shortwave lamp and blackout cloth.

BRING: Standard quarry safety gear is required: hardhat with a manufacturing date of 5 years or less (everyone must have an approved hard hat....no bicycle helmets; small heads can wear a ball cap under the hardhat), high visibility safety vest, safety glasses, respiratory protection from rock dust you may encounter, and a pair of wheel chocks either purchased, homemade or even a rock is acceptable. Every time you leave the car, turn off the engine, put in park and apply the hand brake and wheel chocks. **ONLY STEEL TOED OR REINFORCED COMPOSITE TOED FOOTWEAR WILL BE ALLOWED THIS YEAR. THERE WILL BE NO EXCEPTIONS!!!** If you do not have all the required minimum safety equipment - hard hat, safety shoes, safety vest, and safety glasses, you will not be allowed to enter the quarry. Also required are long pants, gloves, hammer and chisels, wrapping paper, buckets, and water because it is very important to stay hydrated as it may be very hot. If you have any medical condition that would put you in any danger, do not attempt this trip. For your own safety, let your field trip leader or collecting buddy know if you have any medical condition that could be a problem for you. Be prepared for windy, hot, or wet weather. We will be on the mountain top and it's always windy. We can drive to the designated collecting area, so hand trucks should not be needed. Bring a camera, as the view is awesome.

SAFETY REQUIREMENTS: Everyone must plan to arrive at the office parking lot between 7:30 AM and no later than 8:30 AM to read and sign the updated Liability Form, Hazard Training & Recognition Check List Form, and to hear the mandatory safety briefing before entering the mine at 9AM. Each Club field trip leader, or their appointed replacement, will act as a safety official while in the mine. Every person is expected to be on the lookout for and call immediate attention to any safety infractions from any collector from any club. Keep in mind that this site is one of the very few that are still open for collecting. Not obeying ALL the safety rules will cause this site to be closed to all future collecting.

FEE: There is no fee.

CHILDREN (Yes): There is no age limit, but no toddlers please. All children must be signed for, closely supervised by an adult, and never left unattended. They must also have all the required safety equipment. No Exceptions!!!

PETS (No): No pets allowed; this is an active working quarry.

WEATHER: The trip will be canceled due to safety concerns in case of hard rain or a thunderstorm. Call to confirm if there is any question.

AFTER THE DIG SOCIAL: This year, the pavilion beside the office will be available immediately after the dig ends at 1PM to relax, cool off, and eat your lunch. This will also be a social get together so that we can have a chance to become better acquainted with the members of our rock club neighbors and to provide some time to relax before their long ride home. There may also be other groups there as invited guests of Kyanite Mining.

Hunting for the Birthplace of the World's Rarest Diamonds

It's hard to overstate the rarity of the Hope and Koh-i-noor diamonds. The stones, excavated from shallow placer mines in India between 1600-1800, are equally famous for their size and clarity. The Koh-i-noor, which is [set in the Queen Mother's Crown of England but India has demanded back](#), weighs a titanic 105.6 carats. But where

did the diamonds originate? Human hands first touched them in a shallow silt deposit along a riverbed, but we've never found the natural cauldron that originally forged the singular stones.

Huge 2,492-carat diamond, believed to be world's second-largest, unearthed in Botswana

A massive 2,492-carat rough diamond, believed to be the second biggest ever found, has been unearthed in Botswana, according to a mining company. The huge stone is thought to be the biggest found since the 3,106-carat Cullinan Diamond was discovered in South Africa in 1905. Canadian mining company [Lucara Diamond Corp.](#) announced Thursday that the "exceptional" gem was found intact in its Karowe mine.
